Buzhardt said the Aug. 12 and Sept. 2, 1970, memos "concern only the First First staff and are considered to be price supports.

Turning to the Sept. 9 schedule, including the briefing paper for what was appar-ently the short meeting with Nelson and Parr, the special White House counsel said these "go to the core of presidential decision-making where the need for confidentiality is greatest .

Buzhardt also cited portions of a Feb. 1, 1972, White House memo dealing with "political contributions and the subject lawsuit" (which had just been filed) and a list of still secret contributions to the Nixon campaign. He said the White House was willing to submit these for Judge Jones' inspection.
