## Texts of Letters on Tapes

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP) — Following are the texts of letters from President Nixon's lawyers, Charles Alan Wright, and the special prosecutor in the Watergate case, Archibald Cox, advising the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia that its suggested compromise on the White House taxes issue had failed.

## Wright Letter

This is to advise you that counsel in the above entitled matter have had lengthy meetings pursuant to the sug-gestion in the courts memo-randum of Sept. 13.

Mr. Cox and Mr. [J. Fred] Buzhardt met on Sept. 17 and 18 and today Mr. Cox and Mr. [Philip A.] Lacavara of his office met with Mr. Buz-hardt, Mr. [Leonard] Gari-nont and myself. I regret to advise the court that these sincere efforts were not fruit-ful. ful.

All participants in these conversations have agreed that we shall say nothing about them except to make this report to the court. I understand that Mr. Cox will similarly advise you of these meetings and of their unsuccessful outcome.

## Cox Letter

This is to advise you that counsel in the above entitled matter have had lengthy

meetings pursuant to the suggestion in the court's memorandum of Sept. 13. Mr. Buzhardt and I met on Sept. 17 and 18 and today Mr. Lacavara of my office and I met with Messrs. Wright, Buzhardt and Gar-ment. I regret to advise the court that these sincere ef-forts were not fruitful. All participants in these conversations have agreed that we shall say nothing about them except to make this report to the court. I understand that Mr. Wright will similarly advise
