Mr. Maheu, who was dismissed by Mr. Hughes three years ago in a corporate shake-up of the billionaire's empire, said he was concerned that the \$100,000 donations might violate Federal campaign laws since they exceeded \$5,000, the minimum amount that had to be reported.

"I seem to recall on each of those instances Mr. Hughes had told me not to be concerned, that he had independently checked and was satisfied the funds would be handled in such a manner as to not violate the law," Mr. Maheu said.

Mr. Maheu said he personally delivered the \$50,000 contribution to Mr. Humphrey outside a hotel in Los Angeles in 1968.
