

# Watergate Session Off Till Wednesday

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30 (UPI) — An alleged campaign spy known as "Fat Jack" and Dwight L. Chapin, President Nixon's former appointments secretary, have refused to testify before the Senate Watergate committee, delaying resumption of the hearings until Wednesday.

Samuel Dash, chief counsel for the committee, said Mr. Chapin and John R. Buckley had been scheduled to testify Tuesday, but the committee decided not to call them when they said they would invoke the Fifth Amendment in response to all questions. He identified Mr. Buckley as "Fat Jack."

As a result, Mr. Dash said, the committee will not resume hearings until Wednesday, when the witness is expected to be Donald H. Segretti, an admitted political saboteur for President Nixon's 1972 re-election campaign. It is uncertain whether the hearings will be held on Thursday or Friday.

Committee attorneys also ob-

tained a three-day delay until Thursday or oral arguments on a suit seeking to obtain tapes of five Watergate-related conversations between the President and his aides. The arguments originally were scheduled for tomorrow before Federal District Judge John J. Sica, but the committee requested postponement because of the death of Mr. Dash's brother, Harold, a Philadelphia architect.

## Linked to Muskie Campaign

The first public reference to "Fat Jack" occurred in committee hearings last week when a Watergate conspirator, E. Howard Hunt Jr., was questioned by Senator Lowell P. Weicker, Republican of Connecticut, about spying efforts on behalf of the White House.

Hunt said a man he knew only as "Fat Jack" last year hired an unidentified person to spy on Senator Edmund S. Muskie's campaign for the Democratic Presidential nomination. He said "Fat Jack" also sup-

plied him with photographed copies of documents from the Muskie camp.

Mr. Buckley, 53 years old, is a former agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation who retired last June as chief of the inspection division of the Office of Economic Opportunity. Mr. Chapin, who now works for United Air Lines in California, has been identified as the White House aide who hired Mr. Segretti to conduct political espionage and sabotage.
