

ARCHIBALD COX . cites "risk of flight"

Cox Opposes Bai For 5 in Break-I

Watergate Special Prosecutor Archibald Cox asked the U.S. District Court yesterday to deny motions for bail by E. Howard Hunt Jr. and four/Miami-area men who pleaded guilty to burgalrizing the Democratic National Committee headquarters.

Trom jail pending imposition of final sentences for their part in the June 17, 1972, break-in at the Watergate.

All have asked withdrawal of their guilty pleas. The Cox brief said Hunt's arguments with support of that motion are frivolous on their face." tee headquarters.

The men are seeking release

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"Because of the absence of a likelihood of success to the motion to withdraw the guilty plea, it would be especially appropriate to deny bail," the brief said.

Of the other four, the brief noted their desire to change their guilty pleas but said "the best resolution" would be "a speedy determination of those motions rather than . . . post-conviction releases which would provide a natural incen-tive for delay."

Cox's brief said each of the defendants has a prior history that indicates the "repeated use of aliases, false identifications and false documents" as well as work in foreign underwen as work in foreign under-cover activities and "significant contact" with un-derground organizations. "It would hardly be unrea-

sonable to conclude that de-fendants, if released, would have continued access to those phony credentials, or to the source of new credentials, which would increase immesurably the risk of flight," Cox's brief said.

In addition Hunt, the four Miamians seeking release are Bernard Barker, Virgilio Gonzalez, Eugenio Marinez and Frank Sturgis.
