

Haldeman Subpoenaed For More Testimony

Former White House chief of staff H. R. (Bob) Haldeman has been subpoenaed for extensive grand jury questioning next week by Watergate Special Prosecutor Archibald Cox. Haldeman's attorneys, John J. Wilson and Frank H. Strick-

ler, said he has been ordered to testify before both the old Watergate grand jury and the new federal grand jury assigned to investigate other alleged administration misdeeds.

The lawyers asked U.S. District Court Judge John J. Sirica yesterday to quash the subpoena as "unreasonable and oppressive," but they said they

expected the motion to be overruled, as was an earlier effort to block renewed grand jury questioning of former White House domestic adviser John E. Ehrlichman.

"We just want to preserve our legal position on any appeal," Strickler said. "We think that when a man is a target of a grand jury investigation, he should not be called. We think this is improper."

Cox' office has replied that grand jury "targets" who do not want to testify can always

avoid appearing by stating their intention to invoke their Fifth Amendment privileges against self-incrimination. However, Strickler said that "we have consistently said that this will not be done by either Mr. Haldeman or Mr. Ehrlichman. We can't see any need for it."

As a result, Haldeman is expected to appear at the U.S. courthouse here for grand jury questioning starting next Wednesday and lasting at least through Friday. 19 OCT
