Congressman Jerome Waldie yesterday demanded an immediate inventory of all the documentary evidence gathered by special prosecutor Archibald Cox in the Watergate probe to guarantee it will not be obliterated.

The Contra Costa county Democrat, who also said he would offer a House resolution tomorrow seeking the President's impeachment, requested Acting Attorney General Robert Bork to conduct the inventory with Conduct the Con

duct the inventory with Cox.

"Unless this action is taken immediately," Waldie wired to Bork, "all the Watergate investigation documents will be put literally in the President's hands—a fact certain to contribute to the already appalling loss of public confidence in the presidency."

Waldie said he was making the request because of "evidence already on public record of the burning, shredding, and disposal of other vital evidence of criminality in the Watergate incident."
