

**Watergate Panel's Orders
To Reporters Are Eased**

MANCHESTER, N. H., Oct. 25 (AP)—Only one of two Manchester Union Leader reporters subpoenaed by the Senate Watergate committee will need to appear for private questioning, and he will probably not have to testify, the newspaper said today.

Ralph Sullivan, the newspaper's lawyer, said the subpoena for R. Warren Pease had been withdrawn and only Arthur Egan would be questioned in executive session at a time convenient to him.

"There is little probability that Mr. Egan will be called upon to testify further," Mr. Sullivan said.

Watergate investigators were in the state last month and asked questions about the letter that was published in The Union Leader in the 1972 New Hampshire Presidential primary campaign of Senator Edmund S. Muskie, Democrat of Maine. The letter alleged that Mr. Muskie had condoned a racial slur against Americans of French-Canadian ancestry.

2,592 Truck Tires Recalled

AKRON, Ohio, Oct. 24 (Reuters)—The Firestone Tire and Rubber Company said today that it was recalling 2,592 truck tires because of inadequate vulcanization. Firestone said that this could result in some of the tires becoming overheated, which could result in premature failure and in extreme cases rapid loss of air.
