Gurney spoke as the White House said a new Watergate prosecutor will be named soon.

soon. Gerald Warren, deputy White House press secre-tary, told reporters, "we want a special prosecutor who is free from partisan political pressures and we're sure that will happen."

Commenting on that plan, Gurney said: "I think above all we've got to have a spe-cial prosecutor that is inde-pendent, because I don't think people are going to buy the idea of a special prosecutor . . . that is the President's man, as part of the administration prosecuthe administration prosecuting the administration.'
