Gurney's Plan for a Nixon-Critics Truce

Senator Edward J. Gurney (Rep-Fla.) has proposed a six-point plan he says will render a "domestic truce between President Nixon and his critics."

Gurney, the Nixon administration's most outspoken backer on the Senate Watergate committee, told a Florida Home Builders Association convention Saturday, night: "Continued turmoil at home will greatly weaken our ability to maintain peace in the world."

 His six-point proposal:

- Independence for the next Watergate special prosecutor.
- Making all presidential tapes available to the Senate

Watergate committee in addition to U.S. District Judge John J. Sirica.

- Allowing someone "wholly trusted by the Congress and the White House" to review Watergate-related material.
- Immediate congressional action "and I mean this very week" on Mr. Nixon's nomination of Representative Gerald R. Ford to be vice president.
- •A halt to "all impeachment proposals and procedures," until Watergate criminal investigations are completed.
- •A call to the American people to receive with restraint the media's reporting of Watergate-related investigations.
