MRS. MITCHELL SEES NIXON 'OUT BY APRIL'

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (UPI) - Martha Mitchell, one of the first public figures to call for President Nixon's resignation, predicted last night that he would have to quit and "will be out by April."

"He's going to be kicked out," she told a United Press International reporter in an evening telephone call. "I'll give him till April at the lat-est." Mrs.

Mitchell, sounding sprightly and in good spirits, said she had reached that con-clusion after being "down in Washington" and otherwise "in touch with the country."

washington and onor that he touch with the country." "People know now that he cannot reign as President, she said. "Everybody in the coun-try is against him." As for her personal life, Mrs. Mitchell indicated that it was all over between her and her husband, former Attorney Gen-eral John N. Mitchell, although she has not taken any steps to seek a divorce. Asked if her marriage was going to last, she replied: "I don't want it to. You don't know what I've been through for four and a half years. But don't worry about Martha. She'll get along."

Mr. Mitchell walked out of their New York apartment on Sept. 11 and moved into a hotel.
