Reports on What U.S. Gives Agnew

Representative John Moss (Dem-Calif.) asked yesterday for an investigation into reports former Vice President Spiro T.

Agnéw continues to re-- ceive chauffered limousine service, use of military aircraft and the help of a staff of eight at government expense.

Moss asked the General Accounting Office to also investigate and advise on continued Secret Service protection.

"Had he received a jail sentence, would the nation have provided protection in a federal detention facili-ty?" Moss asked in his letter to the GAO. Agnew resigned and did not contest a tax evasion charge for which he was placed on three years non-supervised probation and was fined \$10,000.

Moss said he understood Agnew was still receiving the benefits "from the letters I have received and my own inquiries."

He said the Secret Service told him they had received a direct order from Presidnt Nixon "to provide 24-hour, around-the-clock protection to Mr. Agnew for an indeterminate period."

Moss also askd the GAO to determine the cost of the services if they are being provided, what the law is that covers such services and what additional services not cited by Moss is Agnew not cited byreceiving, if any.
