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An attorney for former White House aide Egil (Bud) Krogh said yesterday he will seek a personal subpoena on President Nixon ordering him to deliver tapes and documents related to the burglary of Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist.

Norbert Schlei, Krogh's lawyer, told reporters that a subpoena will be sought at a court hearing tomorrow because the information is vital to show that Krogh was specifically directed by Mr. Nixon to investigate Ellsberg and the leak of the 'Pentagon Papers.

Other defendants in the case are John Ehrlichman, former domestic aide to the President; David Young, a former member of the National Security Council assigned to the White House, and G. Gordon Liddy, another former White House aide.

Schlei previously had filed an alfidavit claiming "President Nixon has, for his own reasons, so far refused to cooperate . . . in permitting access to potential exculpatory evidence."

Schlei told reporters that he is attempting to subpoena the President personally because he is the only one with authority to turn over pertinent records.

Schlei emphasized he was not talking about the Watergate tapes but a particular meeting between Mr. Nixon, Krogh and John Ehrlichman in the Oval Office on July 24. 1971, when intstuctions were given to set up the "plumbers squad" to stop leaks of classified material.

Krogh has indicated that when he authorized the break-in and search of the files of the office of Dr. Lewis Fielding, he felt he was acting in national security interest at the behest of the President.

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
