**WRITER WILL TESTIFY  
ON WATERGATE CASE**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15. — The Senate Armed Services Committee announced today that it would hear testimony in executive session tomorrow from Andrew St. George, a New York writer, about his recently published allegations that the Central Intelligence Agency knew in advance of the Watergate burglary.

Writing in the current issue of Harper's magazine, Mr. St. George said that Eugenio Martinez, one of the five-man Watergate break-in team, had been a C.I.A. operative who had reported to the agency in advance.

Mr. St. George also alleged that Richard Helms, the Director of Central Intelligence

at the time of the break-in, was personally aware of the operations of E. Howard Hunt Jr. and G. Gordon Liddy before the arrests in June, 1972, at the Democratic National Committee headquarters in the Watergate complex. Hunt and Liddy were convicted in the Watergate case.

The hearing was called by Senator Stuart Symington, Democrat of Missouri. Mr. St. George met briefly with the Senator yesterday, committee sources said, but did not provide any immediate substantiation for his allegations.
