**Group That Raised  
Funds for Agnew  
Draws \$2,000 Fine**

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Nov. 19—  
The Salute to Ted Agnew Committee, which held a fund-raising event for former Vice President Spiro T. Agnew last year, pleaded guilty today to four counts of violating Maryland election laws.

Judge James L. Wray of the Anne Arundel County Circuit Court fined the seven-member committee \$2,000, or \$500 on each count.

The charges stemmed from an election report filed by the committee in which a \$49,900 loan was falsely described as contributions from 32 individual donors.

The report was falsified to create the impression that support for the fund-raising event at the Lyric Theater in Baltimore on May 19, 1972, was stronger than it was.

The money, which was lent to the committee from funds raised for the re-election of President Nixon, was given to Alexander M. Lankler, former chairman of the Maryland Republican party. He later resigned.

No member of the committee faced criminal charges as an individual in the case heard today. But a member who also served as treasurer, Blagden H. Wharton, faces other charges of perjury and campaign law violations involving falsification of the report. He has pleaded not guilty to the charges.

Besides Mr. Wharton and Mr. Lankler, members of the committee were Mrs. Lenore P. Meyerhoff, the chairman; Mrs. Charles C. Bresler; John R. Steffey; J. Walter Jones, a close associate of Mr. Agnew, and Roy Pfautch, a professional campaign consultant.

Mr. Agnew, who resigned the Vice-Presidency last month after pleading no contest to tax evasion charges, has not been linked to falsification of the campaign report.
