43% Favor Resignation By Nixon

President Nixon has lost so much credibility over his handling of the Watergate tapes that the number of Americans who think he should resign has risen sharply to 43 per cent of the entire adult public. This call for resignation is up from 36 per cent in October, 31 per cent in September, 28 per cent in September, 28 per cent in August, and only 14 per cent last May. Forty-seven per cent still feel President Nixon should not resign, although this is down from 75 per cent in May. Consistent with this trend,

Consistent with this trend, the number of people who think the President should resign "if it is proven that he knew about the Watergate cover-up" has now reached 59 per cent, up from 55 per cent in October, and 44 per cent in August.

Between Nov. 12 and 15, a cross-section of 1,459 adults in 200 places across the country, interviewed in person, were asked:

Although by 46 to 43 per cent, most people say the President should be given "the benefit of the doubt" over the tapes issue, it is also equally apparent that most people have drawn a judgment that the White House has indeed tampered with the tapes and simply is not telling the truth about them.

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
