

White House Aide Harlow To Quit Post

Presidential adviser Bryce N. Harlow yesterday confirmed reports he soon would be leaving his White House post.

He said no exact date has been set for his departure but it would be "relatively soon."

The 57-year-old political expert who served for eight years as a deputy assistant to President Eisenhower, said he was not leaving out of dissatisfaction with the Nixon White House.

"I had a complete understanding with the President when I came back that it was on a temporary basis," he said, nothing it has been six months since he was recalled to government service from his job as a vice president of Proctor & Gamble.

Harlow was called to the White House last June along with former defense secretary Melvin R. Laird to help Mr. Nixon re-establish his Watergate-shattered staff and repair relations with Congress.

Laird also disclosed this week he would be returning to private life soon.
