Former presidential assistant John Erlichman's McLean house is still unsold and vacant after six months. It was recently reduced in price, but not drastically enough to make anyone snap it up as a bargain. Erhlichman came down from \$139,000 to \$135,500.

The Galloping Gourmet, Graham Kerr, has taken a house on Maryland's Eastern Shore. He and his wife and daughter, currently living aboard their boat on the Chesapeake Bay, will move in Dec. 16 with an open house that will be taped for his television show . . .

To cut down on legal fees, convicted Watergate burglar E. Howard Hunt has changed lawyers again. Sidney Sachs has been asked to turn everything, including Hunt's motion for appeal, over to the personal attorneys of columnist William F. Buckley, C. Dickerman Williams in New York and William A. Snyder Jr. in Baltimore. Buckley, who was with Hunt in the CIA, is godfather to his children and executor of his late wife's will.
