Clerk to Judge Sirica Listens In on Tapes

As/ chief U.S. District Court Judge John J. Sirica monitors President / Nixon's subpoenaed Watergate tape recordings, another person listens, too: Todd Christofferson, a former Mormon missionary, who serves as the judge's law clerk and al-

the judge's law clerk and ar-ter ego. Sirica is in the process of examining the tapes to see whether any contain evi-dence that should be turned over to the Watergate spe-cial prosecution force. He listened to one tape, that of a June 20, 1972, meeting, for four hours last week. Sirica and Christofferson,

Sirica and Christofferson, two men vastly unlike in two men vastly unlike in backgrounds but bound to-gether by one of the most serious internal crises in the country's history, sit to-gether in a jury room behind courtroom No. 2 in the

U.S. District Courthouse. Christofferson, 28, joined Sirica as law clerk on Sept. 1, 1972, just two weeks be-fore the original seven Watergate indictments were handed down. The assignment generally runs for a year, but Sirica asked him to stay on.

He will leave in May to begin a three-month military obligation.

Christofferson was born in Pleasant Grove, Utah,

where his father, Dr. Paul Unristorierson, was a veterinarian. The father treated cattle who were suffering from a flourine emission at a steel plant, and later he was Utah state veterinarian.

The family moved to New Brunswick, N.J., where the father worked for a Squibb laboratory, and then to Chicago, where he joined the William Cooper and Newphews laboratory.

Todd, now a tall, soft-spo-ken, blond-headed young man, did his undergraduate work at Brigham Young in Utah, and took 1965 and 1966 off, as many Mormon young men do, to serve as a missionary in Argentina.

In the Mormon tradition, he does not smoke or drink. Sirica, 69, grew up in rough-and-tumble circum-stances, became a good friend of heavyweight cham-nion Leck Dempooy and Lec pion Jack Dempsey, and leg-end has it that he himself once hit a policeman on the jaw.

Christofferson was graduated from Duke Law School, President Nixon's alma mater. He and his wife, Kathy, have two children, Todd An-drew, 3, and Brynn, 18 months.

Christofferson says of his relationship with Birica: "For purposes of confiden-tiality, I am his alter ego."
