

Mahoney, Bicentennial Chief, Quits

President Nixon has accepted with regret the resignation of David H. Mahoney of New York as chairman of the American Revolution, the White House said yesterday.

Mahoney, chief executive officer of Norton Simon Inc., was chairman of the commission for three years.

Earlier this month, Mr. Nixon signed legislation replacing the commission with a new American Revolution Bicentennial Administration, effective next month. The new agency will be headed by a full-time administrator who is yet to be appointed.

The White House also said Mr. Nixon had accepted the resignation of Milton E. Broodling of Walnut Creek, Calif., as U.S. Commissioner on the International North Pacific Fisheries Commission.
