Baker Says Nixon Has Failed To End Doubt About Watergate

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30 (AP)
—Senator Howard H. Baker
Jr., Republican of Tennessee, said today that President Nixon had thus far failed to remove public doubt about his role in Watergate. But, he said, "as of this moment, the odds would favor the President continuing his term."

Senator Baker, vice chairman of the Senate Watergate committe, was interviewed on the American Broadcasting Company television program "Issues and Answers."

He said Nixon's efforts to restore public confidence in him had been damaged when the White House did not make full disclosure of all Watergate-related information is so bad and

The situation is so bad and

disclosure of all Watergate-re-lated information.

"The situation is so bad and the level of concern and disquiet of the country so great that you cannot stand on narrow technicalities" as grounds for withholding information, Mr. Baker declared.

He said he had personal knowledge that at least some of the information that Mr. Nixon refused to disclose on grounds of national security that those considerations would be "more helpful than hurtful" to the President.

"There are other things—animals thrashing around in the forest," he said. "I can hear them, but can't see them. I do know of other things that I know should be investigated."

He said some involved national security, but maintained that those considerations should be weighed against "domestic tranquility."
