President Nfxon, who came to this resort in search of the sun, relaxed yesterday at a palatial estate and put in a some time on his State of the Union address.

The President celebrated his 61st birthday at a quiet dinner Wednesday night at the 250-acre estate of Walter Annenberg, U.S. ambassa-dor to Great Britain, after driving here from San Clemente.

With him were his wife. Pat. his daughter, Tricia Cox, and his close friend, Charles G. (Bebe) Rebozo, a Florida banker. Annenberg and his wife were heading back to London.

In a brief announcement, the president's office said, "The President plans to enjoy the weather in Palm Desert which is excellent. He has conferred with aides by phone this morning and will spend some time going over material relating to the State of the Union.
