Mr. Ehrlichman resigned from the White House staff April 30 and returned to Seat-tle to practice law. He has since made a number of trips to Washington and has ap-peared before one of the grand juries investigating the Water-gate scandals. John J. Mr. Ehrlichman has been in-dicted under California laws in a burglary-conspiracy case that grew out of a break-in in Sep-tember, 1971, at the Beverley Hills office of Dr. Lewis F. Fielding. Dr. Fielding, a psy-chiatrist, had treated Dr. Dan-iel Ellsberg, central figure in the Pentagon Papers trial. The burglars sought files on Dr. Ellsberg.
