

Nixon Job Rating Slips Back to 27 Per Cent Low

PRINCETON, N.J.-President Nixon's job rating has slipped back to its low point of 27 per cent approval after a brief 4-point gain during "Operation Candor."

Mr. Nixon's job rating de-clined from 32 per cent in late September to 27 per cent in late October, largely as a result of the firing of special Watergate prosecutor Archi-bald Cox. "Operation Can-dor Launched in November dor, launched in November, succeeded in halting the trend, but subsequent surveys show that the effects

of Mr. Nixon's "going public" have been short-lived. Following is the question asked about each incumbent President since FDR's ad-ministration

"Do you approve or disap-prove of the way Nixon is handling his job as Presi-dent?"

[The question was asked before technical experts testified that a tape gap was caused by at least five separate erasures and re-recordings].

Here are the national findings and trend since September:

Republicans. Amone GOP voters, a slight majority, 53 per cent, approve while 35 per cent disapprove and 12 per cent have no opinion. In comparison, only 11 per cent of Democrats and 26 per cent of independents approve of the way Mr. Nixon is han-dling his job.

The South continues to be the President's strongest re-gion, but by a decreasing margin. Among Southerners, margin. Among Southerners, 33 per cent express approv-al, compared to 41 per cent who did so in the first sur-vey following the start of "Operation Candor." Mr. Nixon conducted a brief speaking tour in that region as part of "Operation Can-dor."

Mr. Nixon's current job rating—which equal his low point to date—is eight points lower than President Lyndon Johnson's low point of 35 per cent approval, recorded durcent approval, recorded dur-ing a period of growing pes-simism over the Vietnam war. The findings reported are based on a national survey of 1,504 adults, 18 and older, in-terviewed in person in more than 300 scientifically selected localities during the pe-riod Jan. 4-7, 1974.

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
