

Reagan, Javits On Impeachment

Governor Ronald Reagan of California and Senator Jacob Javits (Rep-N.Y.) urged in separate interviews yesterday that the House of Representatives decide quickly whether to impeach President Nixon.

"If the Democratic leadership and the committee which is studying it think they have grounds for impeachment, I wish they'd get on with it and clear it up." Republican Governor Reagan said on NBC's "Meet the Press."

"They should go ahead and not drag it out discussing it," he said, calling on congressmen to "quit hassling."

Senator Javits, on the

WCBS-TV program "Newsmakers," called for an early vote "for the good of the country."

He said the House must make an early determination of the issue because of the mood of the country in recent weeks.

Reagan, commenting on a Gallup poll that showed Mr. Nixon with only 27 per cent approval among voters, said: "I think there's great confusion on the part of the people." He gave this as another reason for speeding a decision.

Reagan opposed any idea of Mr. Nixon's resignation, and Javits declined to comment on it.
