CDC Urges Impeachment

Delegates to the California Democratic Council called yesterday for the impeachment of President Nixon.

The group also urged that the Legislature take prompt action to abolish all laws pertaining to prostitution in the California criminal code.

In calling for impeachment, the CDC said that "the President's repeated denials of the charges against him have not arrest-

ed the decline of the American people's confidence and trust in him."

The prostitution resolution, similar to the CDC's position in 1972, called prostitution laws the source of graft and corruption and said they are enforced against the poor and minority groups at great costs in police and judicial resources.

The delegates also endorsed the pending intiative measure which calls for decriminalization of marijuana. Criminal penalties for the adult private use, possession, transportation, and cultivation of marijuana would be removed by the initiative.

Voters in the state defeated a similar measure in 1972.

Other resolutions adopted by the delegates, in the final day of the convention, supported the United Farm Workers and striking Sears workers, called for a moratorium on new nuclear power plants, endorsed tougher gun laws, opposed proposed in-creases in Pacific Gas and Electric Co. rates and urged that the legal drinking age be lowered to 18.
