

Nixon, Wallace Speeches Set

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President Nixon will share a platform Monday with Gov. George C. Wallace when they speak at an "Honor America Day" ceremony in Huntsville, Ala.

The White House announced yesterday that Mr. Nixon would fly to Key Biscayne, Fla., at "midweek" and would dedicate a hospital in Miami Thursday.

After spending the weekend at his Florida home, the President will stop in Huntsville en route to Washington Monday for the "Honor America Day" ceremony sponsored by the Madison County Sertoma Club.

Following the White House announcement that Mr. Nixon would speak in Huntsville, Wallace's office announced that he also would be present. The ceremony, first held a year ago, is to be an annual event in Huntsville. White House deputy press secretary Gerald L. Warren said in announcing the President's travel plans.

In Miami, the President will dedicate the south building of the Cedars of Lebanon Hospital.

The trip will be the President's first to his Florida home since mid-November, when he combined it with a speech in Georgia, a question-and-answer session with the Associated Press Managing Editors association in Orlando and a conference with Republican governors in Memphis.

Warren called the President's trip a "working" one which suggested he may use The Spirit of '76, a Boeing 707, for the first time since the onset of the fuel shortage.

When the President went to California the day after Christmas he gave no advance

notice and flew on a commercial aircraft. He returned to Washington on an Air Force JetStar, a small plane which has seats for only about a dozen persons.

Warren said in announcing the trip that the White House would return to its previous practice of chartering a press plane to accompany the President; the cost as usual will be borne by the organiza-

tions assigning reporters and photographers to the trip.

There have been some indications that Mr. Nixon will make more out-of-town speaking trips this year than last. When a reporter asked if he would travel to a state north of the Mason-Dixon line, Warren said that he "will indeed be visiting other areas of the nation and we will announce them as they are set up."

Last year, Mr. Nixon favored the South in arranging his speaking tours. In addition to speeches in South Carolina, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana and Tennessee, however, he also spoke in California, Missouri and Illinois.

Warren said that while in Key Biscayne, the President would work on special messages he plans to send to Congress.
