The General Accounting Office notified the Treasury Department yesterday that after Sunday it will not allow any more payments for Secret Service agents as-signed to former Vice President Spiro T. Agnew.

In a letter to Treasury Secretary George P. Shultz, Comptroller General Elmer B. Staats said the payments for the agents were not authorized under any law.

Agnew left for a vacation in Palm Springs, Calif., ear-lier in the week with an escort of agents estimated at between 12 and 21 by a con-gressional critic of the practice, Representative John E. Moss (Dem-Calif.)
