President Nixon's 25-year-old daughter was in surgery 44 minutes last night at the In-diana University Medical Cen-ter where two of the state's leading gynecologists removed a benigh cyst. Her mother and her husband rushed by separate military jet

after the operation. Afterward, a hospital spokes-man read a statement saying Mrs. Eisenhower was experiencing some postoperative; discomfort and pain, but was: considered in satisfactory con-dition. Mrs. Eisenhower had come to Indianapolis for an editorial meeting of the Saturday Even-ning Post, where she is a \$10,-000-a-year assistant editor. Dr. Cory SerVaas, wife of Curtis Publishing Company said Mrs. Eisenhower became ill during the meeting and was taken to their home in a suburb of Indianapolis.

taken to their home in a suburb of Indianapolis. "Julie complained of pain in her lower back," Dr. SerVaas said. "She spent a restless night at our house and by Wednes-day noon she was in extreme pain."

Dr. SerVaas took Mrs. Eisen-hower to Dr. Sprague Gardiner, one of the state's leading gyne-cologists, who found substant internal bleeding and had Mrs. Eisenhower admitted to the Krannert Pavillion of the uni-versity's medical center. "At first we thought it was an ectopic pregnancy," Dr. Ser-Vaas said. "But we found she had a benign ovarian cyst. "The cyst was removed and the bleeding was stopped. Everything went well." Dr. SerVaas said the opera-tion should not affect Mrs. Ei-senhower's ability to bear chil-dren. Both Dr. SerVaas and Har-

dren. Both Dr. SerVaas and Har-rison Ullmann, a hospital spokesman, emphasized there was no tubular pregnancy, as some reports had stated. The operation, by Dr. Gar-diner and Dr. Jack Pearson, lasted 44 minutes "and was pretty much routine," Dr. Ser-Vaas said.
