Republicans are 'mixed'

A Republican Unhappy With Nixon

Barry Goldwater Jr. said yesterday he is "totally dissatisfied with President Nixon's leadership."

But the craggy-jawed Republican congressman from Burbank said he would not join those asking Mr. Nixon to resign.

Goldwater, 35, was in San Francisco to address 4000 delegates to the Western States Meat Packers Association, whose four-day convention ended yesterday.

While Republicans are "mixed" on whether Mr. Nixon should be impeached,

he said yesterday, the Democrats don't really want this to happen — they'd rather see the President suffer.

"Republicans want the air cleared, and the President declared innocent or guilty," Goldwater declared. "They want to get rid of the cloud. As for the Democrats, it's in their best interest to drag it out."

He said the nation would have forgiven Mr. Nixon if he had "nipped Watergate in the bud and just shown a little humility."

"If that were done, if he'd been very open and admitted the mistakes, there wouldn't have been such a Watergate furor."

Goldwater also said he wouldn't be part of a congressional effort to get the President to resign.

"The issues are cloudy," he said. "What ARE the bill of particulars against the President?"

He predicted the House Judiciary Committee will dawdle until near election time before acting on the impeachment question, so as to get the maximum mileage out of the President's crippling predicament.

Goldwater was applauded several times when he told the meatpackers earlier that the federal government should "get out of agriculture to the maximum extent. If you want to be dependent, you have to accept the penalty of government interference."

At the press conference which preceded his speech, Goldwater said he was impressed by the "beautiful way" that Mayor Joseph L. Alioto converted his wife Angelina's recent disappearance from a "political disaster to an asset."
