

A Watergate Dismissal

David Eisenhower, son-in-law of President Nixon, dismissed the grand jury indictments handed down in the Watergate case yesterday as "nothing new."

"These accusations were made a year ago," he said at the White House after he had welcomed 500 Young Republicans to a reception. "They don't represent anything new. Guilt or innocence still has to be proved."

Personalities

He said he had seen President Nixon before the reception and Mr. Nixon did not appear upset by the indictments.

After giving hundreds of autographs to the young people, he hurried upstairs to take his wife, Julie, to their Bethesda home. The Eisenhowers have been liv-

ing at the White House while Mrs. Eisenhower recovered from an operation for an ovarian cyst last month in Indianapolis.
