"As you know this is my first "As you know, this is my first visit to Venezuela since 1958, when Venezuela was taking the hard road towards democracy, and I marvel at your many ac-complishments in the last 16 years," the President's wife said in a brief statement as she ar-rived at Majouatia Aimort

Mrs. Nixon was met by the Venezuelan Chief of Protocol, Germán Nava Carillo, and the American Ambassador, Robert

"I am proud to come to Ven-ezuela to represent the Govern-ment and people of the United States for the inauguration of your newly elected President," Mrs. Nixon said. The inaugura-tion is to take place tomorrow. "Venezuela has given the world an example of peaceful elections in democracy and free-dom," she continued. "I speak today for President Nixon and the American people in extend-ing congratulations to all the Venezuelan people for your achievements." Caracas is Mrs. Nixon's first

Nixon Sees Wife Off Special to The New York Times

Special to The New York Times MIAMI, March 11—President Nixon bidding his wife and her party farewell today, cautioned that "we must always remember that here, in this Western Hem-isphere, the Latin-American na-tions are our closest friends." The Nixons, who spent the weekend at their home on Key Biscayne, arrived by helicopter just before noon at Homestead Air Force Base, where they were welcomed by a friendly, flag-waving crowd of several hundred military men and their families.
