WITNESS REBUTS MITCHELL ACCOUNT

Ex-White House Aide Says He Was Told to Stay Out of the Vesco Matter

Daniel Hofgren, a former White House aide, testified yesterday that he had asked John N. Mitchell if he had had a meeting with Robert L. Vesco on the financier's problems and was told, "You stay away from that."

He added, "When John Mitch-

ell says, 'You stay away from it,' I stay away from it." The line evoked a loud laugh from Mr. Mitchell.

Mr. Hofgren then said that

the following day he told Maurice H. Stans that "I had run into Mr. Mitchell and that Mitchell said, 'Stay away from the Vesco matter,' and Mr. Stans replied, 'O.K., we'll take care of it in another way."

Mr. Hofgren's testimony went

to the heart of one of the perjury counts against Mr. Mitchell, the former Attorney General, who had testified before a grand jury on April 24, 1973, that he "never told Mr. Hofgren to stay away from anything."
