Watergate Impact Assessed by GOP

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Opinion at this time among the Republican county chairmen of the nation is that the Watergate scandal will not be the No. 1 issue in the congressional elections this November.

In a mationwide Gallup survey that has brought responses from 2384 GOP county chairmen to date, the most important issue in the opinion of these local party leaders will be the high cost of living. The second most important problem will revolve around the energy crisis. Watergate, and the overall issue of honesty in government, is a poor third.

When asked the specific question about the effect of Watergate — "To what extent, if at all, do you think Watergate will hurt the chances of congressional candidates in your area?" these results were obtained:

A great deal 11% Somewhat40 Hardly at all 17 No opinion 1

Party leaders in the East are the most likely to beveve that Watergate will hurt "a great deal," while Southerners are least likely to hold this belief. The comparison is 17 per cent to 8 per cent. In the Midwest the proportion is 11 per cent; in the Far West. 15 per cent.
