

Rose Mary Woods Testifies

Washington

Rose Mary Woods, President Nixon's private secretary, testified before the Senate Watergate committee for 5½ hours yesterday, presumably about a \$100,000 contribution to Mr. Nixon's election campaign from billionaire Howard Hughes.

Miss Woods was rushed out of the Capitol at about 2:30 p.m. after appearing in closed session before the committee.

On Wednesday and Thursday Charles G. (Bebe) Rebozo, a Florida banker and friend of Mr. Nixon, appeared before the committee to answer questions about the \$100,000 he has said he received from Hughes' agents.

Rebozo said he held the money, received in two \$50,000 installments, in a safe deposit box in his Key Biscayne bank for three years and then returned it to Hughes. He has also said Miss Woods was the only person he told about the contribution.

Miss Woods would make

no comment as she left the building with her lawyer, Charles Rhyne, and federal and capitol police guards.

Rhyne told reporters after

a lunch break that the committee's questioning showed an attitude of "harrassment" toward Miss Woods.
