LOS ANGELES, March 25 (AP)-Robert Finch, former presidential adviser and Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, says that today he "couldn't run for dogcatcher without it turning into a referendum on Watergate."

He blamed former presidential advisers H. R. (Bob) Haldeman and John D. Ehrlichman, among others, for the problems of Watergate, but added that President Nixon, his friend of 25 years, must bear part of the responsibility.

"The President's not without blame" for Watergate, Finch said in an interview. "After all, in the final analysis, the President came down in support of their Halds in support of their—Halde-man, Ehrlichman and others control of the staff, as against

listening to me or somebody else."

Finch, a former California lieutenant governor, resigned his White House post shortly after the 1972 elections. "Haldeman and Erlichman were running the show, and they pretty much kept me out of the decision stream," he said. Finch had little but scorn for many of the presidential addes and campaign officials. "They had a bunch of amateurs in there. Those guys had never run any campaigns."
