Malek and Flanigan Are Said
To Be Leaving as Nixon Aides

BOSTON, April 3 (AP)—Two more influential White House advisers, Peter M. Flanigan and Frederick V. Malek, are planning to leave the Nixon Administration, The Christian Science Monitor reported today.

Mr. Flanigan, executive director of the Council on International Economic Policy, was said to have told friends he would leave his post shortly.

Mr. Malek, deputy to Roy L. Ash in the President's Office of Management and Budget, is making business contacts on the West Coast, the paper said.

Mr. Flanigan in recent months lost a great deal of his authority in international trade when this activity was taken out of the council and given to the office of the special trade representative.
