APR 5 1974 Reinecke's Lawyer in Perjury Case SFChronicle

Lieutenant Governor Ed Reinecke, indicted Wednesday by the Watergate grand jury on three counts of perjury, will be represented by a veteran trial lawyer whose name was well-known in San Francisco a quarter-century ago.

The Chronicle learned yesterday the attorney is F. Joseph (Jiggs) Donohue, 74, who in 1949-50 was the government special prosecutor in the trial of Longshoremen's Union chief Harry Bridges.

Donohue, after one of the most sensational trials in San Francisco history, won a conviction of Bridges for perjury and conspiracy in connection with Bridges' 1945 citizenship hearing.

The verdict was later overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court.

A Democrat, Donohue was appointed Commissionor of Washington, D.C.—a post similar to mayor—by former President Harry Truman.

Donohue came to California to campaign for Congresswoman Helen Gahaqan Douglas in her race for the U.S. Senate in 1950 against the eventual winner, then Congressman Richard M. Nixon.

Donohue is a partner in the Washington firm of Donohue, Kaufmann, Shaw and Kligman.
