The General Services Adninistration said today pre-presidential papers President Nixon donated to the Nasonal Archives are governnent property and cannot be eclaimed by the President.

A spokesman for GSA, parent agency of the National Arthives, said his agency considered the gift legally binding, even though a tax deduction Mr. Nixon took for the gift has been disallowed by the Inernal Revenue Service.

More than half of the papers in question consist of Mr. Nixon's general correspond-ence as Vice President, al-hough the most important tems were removed before he gift was made.
The remainder

consist of locuments collected between 1948 and 1962, including some ewspaper clippings.

The tax issue question whether Mr. Nixon made the ift before Congress abolished illowing deduction for such lonations. Thus, the spokes-nan said, the GSA considers he tax ruling irrelevant to the question of whether the papers now belong to the gov-

At the White House, deputy press secretary Gerald L. War-en said it had always been Mr. Nixon's contention that a ralid gift had been made, inditating he would make no ef-ort to reclaim the papers.

other White House official aid Mr. Nixon has not yet addressed the question of how he will raise the money for werdue taxes from 1969-72.

The GSA spokesman said, however, that Mr. Nixon probably would be free to sell or other wixon papers and memorabilia Nixon papers and memorabilia being stored at the National Archives but not included in the deeds donating some of his papers to the government.

The spokesman said Mr. Nixon would be free to re-claim those papers barring my other legal impediment.
