

Porter Begins Watergate Sentence

LOMPOC, Calif. — Herbert L. (Bart) Porter, once the scheduling director for the Committee for the Re-election of The President, entered the federal correctional institution here Monday to serve a 30-day sentence for lying in the Watergate investigation.

He will serve the full 30 days and then go on probation for one year, according to terms of his sentence.

Porter was indicted on one count of lying to the FBI which carried a maximum penalty of five years in prison and a fine of \$10,000. U.S. District Court Judge William B. Bryan sentenced him to 5 to 15 months, ordered him to serve 30 days of that term and to go on probation for one year after he pleaded guilty.

Miners Strike

INDIANA, Pa.—A 12-day work stoppage which idled 12,000 miners in western Pennsylvania and West Virginia appeared ended when most of them returned to work in compliance with appeals by United Mine Workers leaders.

More than 6,000 were back on the job in Pennsylvania and 2,000 in West Virginia. The remaining 4,000, all in Pennsylvania, were due to return to work at midnight.
