**DISMISSAL OF CHARGE  
IS ASKED BY REINECKE**

WASHINGTON, April 29 (UPI)—Lieut. Gov. Ed Reinecke of California asked the Federal District Court today to dismiss an indictment against him, saying that the special Watergate prosecutor, Leon Jaworski, had promised not to prosecute him. Mr. Reinecke said that, relying on this promise, he had cooperated with Mr. Jaworski and provided information and evidence about an alleged offer of the International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation to help finance the 1972 Republi-

can National Convention, then scheduled for San Diego.

Mr. Reinecke, a candidate for Governor, was indicted by a Watergate grand jury on three counts of lying to a Senate committee about the I.T.T. affair. His attorneys asked for and obtained Friday a postponement of the trial until after the June 4 primary.

In a statement, Mr. Reinecke said the assistant special prosecutor, Joseph C. Connolly, had told him that "if I had 'improved my memory' to falsely implicate the White House and former Attorney General John N. Mitchell, I would never

have been indicted in this case."

Mr. Reinecke made similar charges in defense motions filed earlier this month, which prompted a swift and angry denial from Mr. Jaworski's office.
