edited transcripts of President
Nixon's Watergate conversa-
tions went on sale here today
at the Government Printing Of-
fice Bookstore. The supply was
sold out in a little more than
three hours.One thousand more copies of
the transcripts should be on
sale at the main bookstore here
tomorrow. Copies are expected
to be available at the 18
G.P.O. bookstores around the
country, including the store in
New York, sometime next
week."Tve never seen anything
