Haldeman: John (Ehrlichman) says he is sorry he sent those burglars in there—and that helps a lot.
President: That's right.
Ehrlichman: You are very welcome.

Ehrlichman: You are very welcome, sir.

At which point, according to the transcript, there was laughter followed

by: Haldeman: Just glad the others

didn't get caught.

President: Yeah, the ones he sent to
Muskie and all the rest; Jackson; and Hubert, etc.

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
