Transcripts Are Being Read With an Eye for Perjury

PHILADELPHIA, May 2 (AP) —Senator Howard H. Baker Jr., said today that the Senate Watergate committee staff had begun examining White House transcripts to determine if for-mer Nixon Administration aides had pariured themselves before had perjured themselves before the committee last summer.

The Tennessee Republican said he had read about half the I,300 pages of transcripts pro-vided by the White House to the House Judiciary Committee and the public and he said "much of the testimony of John Dean has been corroborated." Senator Baker, the ranking Republican on the Watergate Committee, said the White House transcripts had "created new lines of inquiry." He refused to elaborate on

He refused to elaborate on the possibility of perjury by witnesses, saying, "I just can't utell."

He said any evidence of per-jury would be given to the Justice Department for possible

jury would be given to the justice Department for possible action. Speaking at a news confer-ence, Senator Baker said he asked Senator Sam J. Ervin Jr., Democrat of North Caro-lina, chairman of the Water-gate panel, to withhold re-lease of the committee report. Senator Baker said the House Judiciary Committee should be allowed to complete its im-peachment investigation before the Ervin committee report was issued. The report was to have been released in late February, but encountered a series of delays as special prosecutor Leon Ja-worski asked the committee to
