evening. PLANTO HELP MILLS LAID TO DAIRY AIDE

WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)
—A top official of the nation's largest dairy cooperative planned to raise \$2-million to elect Representative Wilbur D. Mills of Arkansas to the White House in 1972, according to statements filed in court.

The statements say that Daavid L. Parr, once the second-ranking official of Associated Milk Producers, Inc., believed Mr. Mills, chairman of The House Ways and Means Committee, could capture the Democratic Presidential nomination and defeat President Nixon, who was also receiving substantial support from the milk producers.

According to the statements, attributed to several of Mr. Parr's former associates at the cooperative, Mr. Parr assigned from five to seven salaried employes of the cooperative to assist the Mills Presidential effort, an apparent violation of Federal laws prohibiting indirect donations of corporation money for political purposes.

The statements are in the files of Edward L. Wright, a former president of the American Bar Association, who investigated the co-op's political activities for the group's board of directors. His investigative notes were subpoenaed by the Justice Department Antitrust division and made public in court proceedings.

The milk producers did donate to the Mills campaign, but not to the extent of \$2-million.
