

\$50,000 Winn-Dixie Donation**Rebozo's 'Receipt' for Gift****Key Biscayne**

C. G. (Bebe) Rebozo has a letter from former Commerce Secretary Maurice Stans acknowledging receipt of a secret contribution given to Rebozo by the head of the Winn-Dixie food chain before the 1972 campaign, a source close to Rebozo said yesterday.

The staff of the Senate Watergate committee has been investigating \$50,000 given to Rebozo early in 1972 by A. D. Davis, vice chairman of Winn-Dixie Corp.

The Washington Post reported in editions of May 10 that the committee had been told by Nixon campaign official Frederick C. LaRue that the money never reached President Nixon's campaign organization.

A Rebozo associate said yesterday that the Key Biscayne banker and Nixon confidante has a carbon copy of a letter Stans wrote

"Sometimes I like to indulge in them myself," President Nixon's younger daughter said during a question-and-answer session after her speech to the Girls' Club of Indianapolis Thursday night. About 100 persons, mostly teenagers, attended the meeting.

to Davis as finance chairman for the Committee to Re-elect the President.

The letter was said to acknowledge receipt of a con-

tribution routed through Rebozo, but without mentioning the amount of money involved.

Rebozo's Miami attorney, William Frates, wired committee chief counsel Samuel Dash Thursday asking that he and his client be permitted to appear before the full committee to argue for an end to the investigation, it was learned.

Even as Rebozo battles against a committee subpoena for his financial records dating back to 1968, it was learned that investigators for Watergate special prosecutor Leon Jaworski are here to look into his affairs. The Rebozo friend said investigators for Jaworski are expected to spend about ten days in the Key Biscayne, Miami area.
