

**WHITE HOUSE CALLED
MORE RESPONSIVE**

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP)—Secretary of the Interior Rogers C. B. Morton says that the White House seems to be better organized and more responsive since the Watergate affair forced the resignations of H. R. Haldeman and John D. Ehrlichman.

Until they resigned on April 30, 1973, Mr. Haldeman was White House Chief of Staff and Mr. Ehrlichman was President Nixon's chief adviser on domestic affairs.

Mr. Morton, a former chairman of the Republican National Committee, said in an interview his intuition tells him that Mr.

Nixon is innocent of wrongdoing and will not be impeached.

Asked how the Watergate scandals had affected relations between the White House and the Cabinet, Mr. Morton replied: "We seem to be communicating with them a lot more than when Bob [Haldeman] and John [Ehrlichman] were there. Frankly, I think they're better organized over there than they were."

As for his personal feelings about Watergate, Mr. Morton said: "You kind of feel depressed about it all, because the country is kind of depressed about it. Yet," he added, "when I leave Washington and get into the hinterlands, I hardly get any questions on Watergate at all."
