Winston Lord, now director of planning and coordination, State Department.
Richard Moose, now a consultant to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.
Helmut Sonnenfeldt, now counselor of the State Department.

Lieut. Gen. Robert E. Pursley, former senior military assistant to Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird, now retired.

Richard F. Pedersen, former State Department counselor, now Ambassador to Hungary.
