Watergate Report Blames President For 'Dirty Tricks'

WASHINGTON, June 14 (UPI)—A staff report to the Senate Watergate committee charged today that President Nixon "must be held responsible and accountable" for a systematic campaign of "dirty tricks" against 1972 Democratic Presidential hopefuls.

"This entire effort was coordinated by President Nixon's closest adviser, H. H. Haldeman, and the former Attorney General of the United States, John N. Mitchell," the report said.

"However, it is President Nixon who must be held responsible and accountable for the actions of his subordinates. Not only was he the candidate on behalf of whom these activities were undertaken, he also set the moral and ethical standards by which his re-election campaign operated."

The 350-page draft was another in a series of staff reports being submitted to Senators on the committee, whose final report is due at the end of June. United Press International gained access to a copy of the draft.

The report took up the activities of oDnald H. Segretti, the "dirty trickster" who has been in prison for illegal distribution of campaign literature in the Florida primary; John J. Caulfield and Anthony T. Ulasewicz, White House operatives; Arthur Bremer, convicted in the assassination attempt on Gov. George C. Wallace, and incidents involving Senator Edward M. Kennedy.

Also, the International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation, Dita D. Beard, its Washington lobbyist, and I.T.T.'s pledge of a donation for the Republican National Convention of 1972. The report also discussed the use of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Internal Revenue Service, the Secret Service and White House public relations efforts.
