HARRIMAN, N.Y., June 15 ---Vice President Ford stump-ed across New York today, warning against a "veto-proof" Democratic Congress and denouncing the "nameless leak-ers" he said are trying to "undercut" President Nixon and Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger.

In fund-raising appearances for three Republican congress-men, Ford demanded of the GOP faithful, "Are you going to let them do this to the greatest secretary of state... the greatest President for peace in our history?" "No," the crowds replied.

In an eight-hour swing from Utica down the Hudson Valley Utica down the Hudson Valley to the Westchester County suburbs of New York City, Ford plugged for the re-elec-tion of freshmen Reps. Donald J. Mitchell and Benjamin A. Gilman and third-term Judi-ciary Committee member ciary Committee Hamilton Fish Jr.

Although Mitchell and Gilman both had relatively close races in 1972, when Mr. Nixon ran strongly in their districts, neither of them nor Fish is regarded as a likely casualty of the Democrats' expected November victory. But Ford told several hun-

dred supporters of each man that they must redouble their efforts to deny the Democrats a "veto-proof" Congress.

He said that if the Dem-ocrats " make a net gain of 50 seats in the House and seven or eight in the Senate," the result would be runaway in-flation and "legislative distance" flation and "legislative dicta-torship."

intervention and registrative ducta-torship." "Not only would the most liberal elements of the Dem-ocratic Party be in control of the legislative branch," Ford said in Utica, "they would also be in a position to dom-inate the executive." "If they get that 'kind of devastating, smashing victory in November," he said, "the American people had better tighten their seat belts be-cause we are going on the biggest inflationary ride the United States has ever seen." "The doors of the federal treasury will be wide open," Ford warned. "Deficits will be piled on deficits." be piled on deficits." Ford also asserted that the

same kind of "anonymous at-tacks" that he blamed for President Nixon's problems are now being directed against. Kissinger, the man he called the "greatest Secretary of State in our history." State in our history." His audiences booed when Ford talked of those whose "leaked information and planned efforts to discredit the President and the Secre-tary of State" have been in the news news.
